• Chair Mead called the meeting to order at 1:02 pm.

• Meyer announced the production of Spring Awakening starting this evening thru May 3rd

IV. New Business

- 4.1 Joint presentation on budget & initiatives for 2015-16 Division Heads Followed with committee discussion
- Provost Cruz began the presentation with a power point '2015-16 Budget Process' Objectives – Identified four objectives for discussion:
 - Strategic context for budgeting and planning, Implications of zero- or near-zero growth, Net new baseline and One-time funding projections, Initial recommendations
 - Possible scenario of zero/no growth, new net funding at .75% which includes enrollment - no new baseline money
 - Recommendations for FY 2015-16 budget memo- continue discussion at next meeting

- o Strategic Context
 - Considerations Federal, State, CSU, and CSUF
 - Chancellor's Office identified CSU goals from the State-adopted metrics (16) for success to be implemented by 2025
 - Federal and State levels Rate college programs on student access-return on investment, increased scrutiny on compliance such as Title IX to ensure due process with possible fines placed on institutions for mishandling cases
 - Unknown at this time if additional funding will be granted to CSU even with Legislative support
 - Chancellor White convened a system-wide task force on the Academic Sustainability Plan, recommendations expected in April
 - CFA re-open negotiations system-wide to identify and address inequities, multi-year plan to resolve issues with no new funds
 - Campus addressing the 5-year Strategic Plan, met major goals but continue to work on achievement gap. Additional goals to address: LOF, Irvine, HIP, structural deficits, instruction, infrastructure, deferred maintenance.
 - o Governor's May revise is expected May 15, 2015
- VP Kim continued the conversation by covering a zero or near-zero enrollment growth scenario

o Zero or Near-Zero Enrollment Growth Funding Implications

- CSUF and Enrollment Growth Funding
 - o Budget History
 - No baseline funding all funds have been allocated, centrally management programs such as utilities, risk management
 - o Strategies
 - Challenges in Zero-Growth Era
 - Zero growth mode find ways to fund strategic initiatives, no central reserves or buffer for economic downturn, potential financing opportunities by taking advantage of the low interest rates, plan for future generations
- o FY 2015-16 Funding Projections
 - Projected Revenues Estimates of General Fund Enrollment and Net Tuition for Baseline 14-15 & 15-16 and One-time 14-15 & 15-16
 - Highlights of Previous Years' Funding Commitments
 - Faculty promotions, Two-Year Faculty Hiring Plan (150 faculty positions), Classroom refurbishments (\$400,000), Children's Center (estimated \$100,000), Faculty equity salary adjustments (Chancellors Office)

- Areas of Interest Identified to Date
 - Faculty and Staff Equity Programs, LOFT (\$15 million-\$6 million from CO to cover earthquake repairs), Deferred Maintenance (\$150 million), Capital Improvements, Additional Space (Western Law, CP lease), HIPS, Faculty Tenure Track Density, Part-Time Faculty Blanket, Compliance: Title IX, Clery Act, Structural deficits
- o Initial Recommendations
 - First-Order Recommendations FY 2015-16
 - Continue to advocate for additional state investments
 - Prioritize the list of previous years' commitments reference list above (include capital programs and investments, faculty positions, campus strategic initiatives)
 - Expand the list of major categories used for budgeting and planning purposes, identify major initiatives for each category – example: Title IX
 - Prioritize investments among and within categories use of carryforward funds, capital financing/debt service, manage cash flow
 - Develop multi-year zero-growth funding plans for specific categories/initiatives use various funding options and seek alternatives
 - Establish a central baseline-funding reserve to fund campus-wide initiatives and create baseline buffer for campus
 - Proposed List of Budget Categories
 - New Categories
 - Capital and Facilities Infrastructure Program Chancellor's Office to determine campus process in capital program, shortterm loans from ASC; Faculty Hiring and Tenure Track Density – address in Strategic Plan, Academic Master Plan, and Enrollment Plan; Mission Critical and Compliance Initiatives – Title IX advocacy and resources to train employees and students, hire consultant for Clery to develop infrastructure and make recommendations for improvement
 - o Existing Categories
 - Operationalizing University Strategic Plan, Reinvesting in Instructional & Support Infrastructure, Core Operations Critical to Advancing Institutional Mission, Strategically Addressing Structural Deficits
- Chair Mead requested feedback for next week's meeting
 - Suggestions: Prioritize categories and sub-categories, use quadrant format (urgent-not urgent/important-not important) similar to the LOFT presentation, dot exercise
